Lucia's World Friendly Boutique, located in the Woodland Triangle Shops, 523 E. High Street, is open Monday-Saturday 11:00-6:00 and Sunday from 1:00-5:00. Lucia's offers gifts many of which come from Guatemala. In addition to fair trade items, Lucia's focuses on evrionmentally friendly products. Lucia's will have an open house December 5 and 6.

Second Presbyterian will have fair trade gifts on sale between and after services on December 7.

(Building a United Interfaith Lexington thru Direct Action)

BUILD's Member Support Drive: On November 3rd, 2008 BUILD voted on researching the broad topic of "Youth and Education" into a smaller

winnable issue for 2009. In 2008 for the broad topic of "Healthcare", BUILD brought all of the major players (hospitals, health dept, etc) that provide healthcare to the uninsured of Lexington and asked them to come together and create a plan to increase the healthcare availability for an additional 2000 people (uninsured) each year for the next three years starting in 2009. I am happy to report that these groups have come together and are working to be able to meet more healthcare needs for uninsured people in the future.

Also in 2008 for the broad topic of "Affordable Housing", BUILD asked the Mayor to create an affordable housing trust fund to be operational by the summer of 2009. The Mayor did create a 47 member commission to study this last summer. The Mayor (and BUILD) agreed to the commission's findings except for one major point which is on how the trust fund would receive its funding each year. The commission is recommending a renewable dedicated funding source (an increase of 1 percent to the insurance premium tax or approximately \$15 per average household). Discussions between the Mayor and BUILD are still occurring over the source of funding for this important issue.

BUILD is a non profit organization. BUILD's main expenses are the salaries of its two Lead Organizers, Benjamin Van Dyne and Kelly Doyle who work long hours (~60) each week to help create more justice in Lexington. Anyone who would like to individually donate money to BUILD to help continue its work in justice may do so by designating your check or money to BUILD and placing it into the offering plate. Clerk's Corner

The most recent Stated Session meeting was held on Sunday 16th November 2008.

At this meeting the Session approved the hiring of the Rev. Kathy Riley as Interim Pastor. On November 20, 2008 the Presbytery of Transylvania's Committee on Ministry endorsed the Session's decision.

Rev. Riley will begin her pastorate on November 30, 2008. Immediately following the Called Congregational Meeting on November 30th, there will be a short "Meet the Pastor" reception. All are invited to attend as we extend a warm Hunter welcome to Kathy.

Rev. Riley's position at Hunter is part-time (30 hours/ week). She will be in the office all day on Tuesdays and Thursdays and during the afternoon/ evening on Wednesdays. Friday will be sermon preparation day at home. These hours may be extended as needed for pastoral care.

Interim ministry is Kathy's second career. She began her career in the field of clinical psychology in the area of aging and Alzheimer's research. While a member of Maxwell Presbyterian Church in Lexington Kathy was part of a spiritual formation group and started to work with a spiritual director. During this time she felt a call to ordained ministry and, in 1997, enrolled in the M Div program at Lexington Theological Seminary.

Since graduating from seminary Kathy has served as the temporary Director of Christian Education at Beaumont Presbyterian Church, Interim Pastor at Wilmore Presbyterian Church and Interim Pastor of Meadowthorpe Presbyterian Church. Kathy feels called to interim ministry because of the opportunity to work with churches in transition. Interim ministry allows her to draw on her strengths as she looks at the system in the particular congregation to face issues and challenges they face. She describes herself as non-anxious in the face of the anxiety of others and deliberate in helping others come to consensus around an issue.

Kathy looks forward to working with the congregation at Hunter. She noted Hunter's social justice work and the commitment she sees in this congregation to living out the gospel. She sees the experience of serving as our second interim as a new opportunity for her and for us.

Many thanks are due to the Interim Pastor Search Committee members (Trish Bernard, Alan Lytle and Cynthia Pendergrast) who have worked so diligently on this important endeavor.

Christmas Joy Offering

Special Funds Committee

These institutions develop leaders in the church and in society, and they enable students to discover and pursue their professional goals. All Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)-related schools and colleges are open to any qualified student regardless of race. You are invited to share in this offering at Hunter at the Christmas Eve service.
